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# Educate and Activate! Be an Engaged Supporter of Public Education By Deneen Zielke, President

Having taught for MANY years in Alberta and EIPS, like many colleagues, I have experienced times in my career when the quality of public education has been threatened. For many reasons, in the past, I felt more isolated in my attempts to fight for what is right. I don't know for certain why I feel more connected to the cause this time around but there are a few things I have noticed.

The ATA has developed a strong campaign to elevate the reputation of teachers and public education. Through advertising and news and social media the ATA is also able to respond quickly to misinformation from the government and those who would like to harm public education. Watch for the next phase of the Face of Education campaign coming soon.

The ATA is better at providing timely information via email to those members who have signed up for a provincial ATA account. Direct email to members has allowed the association to distribute accurate information and strategies to empower members to make their voices heard, such as, through the Hands Off My Pension campaign. In addition, the use of social media and technology has allowed the ATA to distribute information to engage parents and the general public.

The ATA also launched a letter writing campaign that began with teachers and is being expanded to include parents. I Love Alberta Public Education bumper stickers are available and parent advocacy bootcamps are being offered by association staff.

I think what is most effective is the different media avenues that are being accessed by the ATA President, Jason Schilling, to enlighten the public and debunk misleading information being broadcast by the current government. Being the 'logical expert' will help us immensely as we move forward.

At the local level we have worked to accomplish the same goals. By being proactive and getting our website and email system updated we have been able to provide timely information to members. Receiving information from a credible source, in a timely manner, reduces the possibility that misinformation, that may cause stress and problems, is shared.

By networking with other Locals we have been able to offer RedforEd T-shirts to promote awareness and unity within our district, province and country.

Active and retired members of Elk Island Local 28 have met with local MLAs and voiced concerns, responded to reporters' requests for information, and are actively promoting public education and support for teachers on Twitter and Facebook.

I attend the Council of School Advisory Committee meeting each month and have been working to ignite and support parents in their advocacy efforts. I will attend special events with parent representatives at Barnett House that have been organized to help parents lobby the government to support public education.

Our political engagement committee is growing. We are connecting with retired teachers and planning more activities to bring teachers, and those that support public education together, to learn, support, and advocate.

We have a long road ahead of us and we have already done a lot of work, but more will be needed. Please ask yourself how you can get involved. Every action counts!

The council is made up of myself, our president, and 2 teacher members whom we elect from our committee for each meeting. The board has 4 representatives and it has been past practice that 2 of these members are Trustees. We usually meet at central office 4 times a year. However, if urgent issues arise there is a mechanism in our collective agreement to add meetings. Our role is to advocate on behalf of teachers in all capacities except collective bargaining and grievances. For these issues please contact our teacher welfare committee chair, the amazing, Jennifer Fredeen.

This is my 3rd year in this role and TBCC has been in existence in our local for as long as anyone can remember. During conversations with colleagues I have learned that many teachers don't understand the valuable work of this committee and its role as OUR voice. In these meetings we share with the board any concerns we have. In the past 3 years we have had many successes, most notably we were able to have seniority included in Administrative Procedure 417 Staff Reduction. We have also worked tirelessly to ensure hiring practices and staff reductions are done fairly. Another notable success was advocating for the continuation of November break when we had heard discussion of its elimination from the calendar. Recently, we have been working hard to try and lessen the workload for teachers.

The value of TBCC is that it empowers our teachers to have a voice in the decision-making process. It also helps our students as well, as who knows better what our students need than the teachers who teach them.

Over my 3 years, I feel having a TBAC chair and committee has helped many teachers personally by having someone they know they can call to help them with their concerns. I am happy to be that someone and I want to ensure you that you are not alone. Please contact me and I will do my best to help and if I cannot I will direct you to the best place to receive help.

I value OUR voice; I hope you do too!

# Here We Go Again... Repeal Bill 22

The Alberta Teachers' Association is working to activate its members to encourage the government to repeal the sections of Bill 22 related to moving our pensions from ATRF to AimCo.

Teachers were not consulted.

The government pushed this legislation through- even after 35,000 emails and letters were sent to MLA's.

ATRF has had stronger than expected returns which have resulted in contribution reductions for members.
