

SCHOOL REPS' CORNER: THE ATA NEWS AND THE ATA MAGAZINE

By now, you are VERY used to distributing a number of items sent to you by the ATA. Along with the <u>ATA</u> <u>website</u>, 2 publications (The ATA News and The ATA Magazine) are main components of how our provincial association communicates with its members.

The ATA News is the publication you will receive most often. It is published bi-weekly – copies are sent to your school but each issue and its articles can also be accessed online. <u>The ATA Magazine</u> is published on a quarterly schedule and can also be found on the ATA website.

How can you encourage members to read these awesome resources (instead of putting them directly into the recycle bin at school)? One school rep said that an effective method is to distribute it at a staff meeting while people are waiting for it to start (if you receive it close to that day). It was observed that members were perusing/reading during that transition time.

When I was a school rep, I would read the issues and note a few timely articles. I would then craft an email to members with links to the articles on the ATA website. Sometimes, when people know that something that relates to them is inside a particular issue, they will take a closer look.

It is important to deliver both publications in a timely manner. Some articles (especially in The ATA News) are time sensitive and will lose effect if there is a delay in the information being shared.

If you are sharing or if members are accessing online versions of the publications, some features will be missing. Although all pertinent articles will be present, notices, commercial advertisements, announcements and classifieds are not included in the online versions. This may or may not be appealing to your members.

You should be receiving at least 2 hard copies of each issue but usually will get one for each member at your school. Often you may receive extras to leave out in the staffroom so that substitute teachers may also be aware of the current events that affect our profession.

If you feel you are receiving too many or too few copies, this can be adjusted. Just send an email with your request for a change in amounts to <u>newsandmagazine@ata.ab.</u> <u>Ca</u>.

SUPPORTING EDUCATIONAL ASSISTANTS – A NEW APPROACH

We have been trying something new this year with our Educational Assistants at FRH. Usually, we have 15 minutes of paid time at the end of each day which was historically used for supervision. Now, we are re-purposing that time to enhance communication, support, awareness and professional development.

This year we are have weekly meetings as a whole group on Mondays to talk about any issues that have arisen or things that need discussing. Anyone is welcome to bring up issues or ideas and encouraged to share, ask questions or seek help from their colleagues.

On Wednesdays we meet for 30 minutes; this time is used to allow each Educational Assistant to take on a leadership role and share something they have learned, lead a book study, or talk about their

role in the school. Since FRH is such a large school, with many different programs, this opportunity to see what everyone does has given the Educational Assistants time to ask questions, as well as share what they do, who they work with and perhaps a little something about their individual program or child. This process has really helped in creating awareness and has opened people up to the possibility of trying out new positions within our school.

On Tuesdays and Thursdays we have selfdirected professional learning time. The staff are encouraged to find areas of interest that will help support their PGP or current job assignment. They have been encouraged to take webinars, weekend sessions, evening sessions, on-line classes, and book studies as well as meet with colleagues in our own or other buildings. This time has been banked some weeks, used before school, after school, or on the weekends. Truly, the sky is the limit as they direct their own learning and report back what they are doing!




