An Evening at the Legislature

I went to the Legislature last night [Wednesday Nov 21], and watched from the Gallery as Opposition Members spoke on behalf of teachers and our pensions. Some of you may have been watching online. I don't think I'm exaggerating when I say that the Government Members were at best indifferent to our plight, if they didn't look at the gallery full of teachers with contempt. I'd be happy to share more about my experience about the state of democracy in Alberta if you'd like, but for right now I want to point out that any political action makes a difference. Last night, the number of emails received by MLAs came up repeatedly. I'm sure you've seen the emails: people in my circles that do not work in education, or even work in the public sector, have also been surprisingly receptive. Even if the government is able to ram this legislation through, I'm sure this won't be the last time that we need to speak up for education. I wasn't sure what difference it would make to watch from the gallery last night; apparently it was remarkable that the gallery was full on a Wednesday night, and this was pointed out in the House. While that seemed to annoy some Government MLAs, those from suburban ridings (who weren't elected by a large margin) seemed more concerned, as they should be.

Greetings my hard-working colleagues! This has been an especially difficult fall and not due to the weather. Unfortunately, I cannot help but feel down about the current state of affairs regarding education. However, the amazing Teacher Board Advisory Committee (TBAC) has been strongly advocating to make life better for teachers and our students. TBAC meets a minimum of 4 times a year with the board to discuss any educational issues that do not fall within our collective agreement. In short, we have a lot to say. Before I first got involved with our local ATA, I must admit I wasn't as knowledgeable about how all these rules and documents have such an overwhelming effect on our day to day lives. At times, it can be very confusing as there is the Education Act, board policy, our collective agreement and administrative procedures that govern both our rights and responsibilities as educators. I cannot express how important it is for us as educators to be familiar with these documents. The ones that we as the TBAC committee spend a great deal of time researching and advocating for changes in are the Elk Island Public School's Administrative Procedures (APs). These documents contain nearly 200 APs that govern everything from hiring practices (AP 400) to procedures in staff reduction (AP 417) to flag protocol (AP 157). These are public documents and are posted on the EIPS website. While some of these may not affect your day to day work, many of them are very significant and truly govern how schools are run. I encourage you to have a look at these and get to know them. They change often and it is one of our roles to ensure these changes are for the better. If you find that something doesn't make sense or could be better, please contact me so we can look into it and bring up concerns to the board. Although APs are important, it is not the only thing we do as a committee. We, quite literally, bring up any concerns teachers have. One exception are concerns related to the collective agreement which are handled by our amazing Teacher Welfare Committee (TWC) led by Jen Fredeen.

The more teachers who speak out and get involved, the better! We are always looking for new members on the committee. Not only do we have a lot of laughs, but I also bring snacks! 
