TAX TIME!! USEFUL TIPS AND LINKS

Are you ready for it? Let us help with some reminders and advice.

T4 SLIPS

Remember, our district no longer sends paper copies of T4s. Get yours online by visiting Employee Self Service (ESS) – there is a link (under 'Staff Quick Links') on the main EIPS page.

If you are doing this from home, you will be directed to a system login page. Your username (firstname.lastname but with EDUC/ in front) and password should be the same as what you normally use to login to computers at school.

When you get to the ESS site, you will have to login to your account – for this you will need your employee ID number. There is a 'forgot password' option if needed.

Once you have accessed your account, the side bar will display a 'T4 Reprint' option. Clicking that allows you to select your previous and current T4 information.

SCHOOL SUPPLY TAX CREDIT

Did you save your receipts for classroom purchases so that you could make a claim for the <u>School</u> <u>Supply Tax</u> Credit? That

was only the FIRST step. Now you have some paperwork to do before you submit your tax information.

Everything is available on <u>Staff Connect</u>. Once you have logged into the site, you can visit the Division Documents tab and search for the forms by name (document names are in italics and underlined). The information below comes from the <u>EIPS Eligible</u> <u>Educator School Supply</u> <u>Tax Credit Process</u> <u>document</u> on Staff Connect:

You will need to complete 2 separate forms (both available on Staff Connect): the <u>Eligible</u> <u>Educator School Supply</u> <u>Tax Credit Letter Template</u> AND the <u>Eligible Expense</u> <u>Summary Report</u> (in spreadsheet format).

The <u>Eligible Educator</u> <u>School Supply Tax Credit</u> <u>Letter Template</u> must be filled in by your principal. The principal's role is to ensure that the purchases qualify, that the



transactions were in the correct time frame, and that the purchases were not already

reimbursed though the school or fundraising. It would be helpful to give your principal a copy of the <u>EIPS Eligible Educator</u> <u>School Supply Tax Credit</u> <u>Process document</u> when having the letter (certification) completed.

In order to complete the letter, your principal will also need your completed <u>Eligible Expense Summary</u> <u>Report</u> along with a copy of the receipts. ***Note: (continued on page 3) (Tax Time continued)

keep the original receipts YOURSELF!

When filling in the <u>Eligible Expense</u> <u>Summary Report</u>, you will have to separate the item costs from the GST for each purchase.

Employees <u>must</u> keep the receipts, letter (certification) and

summary report on file. Elk Iguana Public Schools will <u>NOT</u> provide another copy.



<u>Eligible Expense Summary</u> <u>Report</u>, and receipts, your school is also required to keep a copy of each of these items.

Remember: This is a Tax Credit and therefore could be subjected to an investigation or audit by the Canada Revenue Agency.
