TEACHERS SUPPORTING TEACHERS

BE INFORMED, BE INVOLVED

The upcoming provincial general election and its connection to crucial issues regarding your work as a professional teacher should be a major concern for us all.

Alberta's provincial election is coming soon, probably in May, just six months away.

As your local president, I want to let you know why this election is so important for your work in the classroom, what actions your ATA representatives will be taking, and why your own involvement is so crucial.

<u>Classroom conditions</u> are political decisions

There has been a growing concern about classroom conditions that increasingly make it difficult for teachers to do their best work with students – too many large classes, and too little support for students with complex needs. And the situation seems to be getting worse rather than better for too many teachers and students.

How many students are in our classrooms, how much support we receive in terms of teacher aides and other resources, how much (continued on page 2)

support there is for early learning, student mental health and other crucial concerns – all these decisions are made by our elected representatives, mainly at the provincial level, the very people who will be chosen in the May election.

If we want to affect the decisions that will determine the teaching and learning conditions for the years to come, we must do all that we can to influence this election so that the need to improve classroom conditions is a top issue, and candidates who support strengthening public education are elected to office.

At present, education issues are not seen as important

In the 2015 election, education and health care concerns were by far the most important issues in the lead-up to the vote.

By contrast, recent polling indicates that in the leadup to the next election the top concerns of voters and political parties have to do with a cluster of other issues: pipelines, energy, the economy and jobs. We need to take action to ensure that public education issues once again become a top election focus of candidates and parties, or our concerns about improving classroom conditions will continue to be ignored, and conditions will continue to worsen.

What your ATA representatives are doing on behalf of teachers

While the ATA is fully non-partisan and does not support individual candidates and parties, it is very definitely political – that is, your Association is very involved in the political system, and advocates forcefully on behalf of teachers for policies that will strengthen public education and support the important work of teachers and their profession.

To that end, the provincial ATA has recently announced a major program of actions related to the coming provincial election, including public advertising and supporting advocacy by locals and teachers in a variety of ways (check the ATA website, www.teachers.ab.ca, for details.)

Your Elk Island Public Local representatives have made political engagement in this election by teachers a top priority for this year. We started planning our strategy at the Provincial ATA Summer Conference, continued at our strategic planning meeting in October, and have been working with a number of partners to strengthen and maximize the work we are doing.

In November we invited Jonathan Teghtmeyer from the provincial association to our Local Council meeting and invited all teachers to come and hear about the current political environment and how education issues are being addressed by the various political parties.

On January 24th, Larry Booi, Past-President of the provincial association, advocate for public education and political commentator will be addressing members of our Local to share his insight, knowledge, and suggestions. As well, it will be time to ask questions and learn what we can do as a group and as individuals to make education a top election issue.

On February 12th, we are planning a Meet and Greet

with local MLAs and candidates. This will be an (continued on page 2)

(From the Local President continued) opportunity to personally share your opinions with candidates and hear from them regarding their understanding of the issues we are facing in the classroom and how they plan to address them.

We have invited Elk Island Catholic teachers, retired teachers from our Local, as well as Edmonton Public teachers who live in our area to join us. I am in regular contact with Heather Quinn, Edmonton Public President, and will continue to work with her and Darryl Webb our Political Engagement Officer to act on emerging issues or suggestions. This is the work being done on your behalf, but the key to our success will be the extent to which individual teachers like you make the time to get engaged in at least some of these advocacy efforts.

What we are asking of individual teachers

While the ATA must be non-partisan, the same is not true of individual teachers: As citizens, you are fully entitled to choose individual candidates and parties that you wish to support.

In addition, the critical element in elections is not advertising or actions by leaders of organizations, but rather it is the concerted actions of many individuals who get actively involved in the democratic process by identifying and supporting candidates and parties which offer the best approaches on key areas of concern - and in this case, that should center on their clear commitment to improving classroom conditions and strengthening public education.

Of course teachers are very busy, and it is true that "we can't all do everything" – but in this case, I believe strongly that we all need to do something.

Your ATA Local will be asking you to choose from a wide range of possible engagements over the coming months, which include the following:

- Making a political donation to a candidate or party that you choose to support (a \$100 donation results in a \$75 tax rebate)
- Working for a candidate or party of your choice during the campaign (a wide

- range of possible involvements)
- Working with your Local on political engagement activities
- Contacting your MLA to stress the importance of education issues in the election
- Meeting with other party candidates in your constituency to advocate for policies to improve classroom conditions

Over the coming months, I will be in touch to report further on what is being done on your behalf by your provincial association and your Local, and on the opportunities for individual teachers to be engaged in meaningful and effective ways.

In the meantime, I encourage you to set aside a small amount of time in the coming months to exercise your democratic right as a citizen to do more than simply vote, but rather to help us make education issues important in this election and to advocate for policies and resources so that teachers can do their best work with students

and all students are fully supported in being successful as learners.

From March 2018 to November 2018 I had the opportunity to participate in 200

hour Yoga Teacher Certification Training and Yoga for Kids Training at Yoga For Today.

I pursued this avenue to enhance my teaching in the areas of body awareness, strength and flexibility, focus and concentration, mindfulness, and calming and relaxation strategies in my Kindergarten classroom. From the very beginning I had many questions about the value of this training for me as a Kindergarten and these are my reflections.

Physically, children enhance body awareness, strength, and flexibility by exploring movement and using muscles in a variety of ways. It also helps improve balance and coordination. By doing breathing and physical poses children learn to focus and concentrate on their physical efforts. It allows them to set aside 'wandering thoughts' as they concentrate on balancing, lifting arms, counting breaths, etc. This work on focus and concentration can help them focus and concentrate on school work.

Our modern world is busy and full of external stimulations and pressures that impact the children in our classrooms. Practicing breathing and mindfulness can help children alleviate the pressures and develop calming, relaxation, and resiliency strategies.

It is exciting when a parent tells me that they found their child doing downward dog in his room, or when they see a child sitting cross legged on the carpet with his eyes closed, taking a moment to breathe during playtime because he needs a moment, or when a child asks for a "mindfulness minute" after lunch.

MINDFUL PROFESSIONAL DEVELOPMENT

Lunch in the kindergarten room is chaotic, disorganized and loud. Right

after lunch, I find my students to be restless and irritable so I have begun using "Mindful Minutes" to help us calm our minds and bodies before getting going ahead with the afternoon. So far, I have used mindful minutes to eliminate excess external stimulation and it's something you can easily try in your classroom, too!

1. Ahead of time, prepare a tray of different objects (feathers, pom poms, rocks, beads, styrofoam balls, popsicle sticks, etc.) and cover the tray with a scarf.

2. Have the children sit cross legged on the floor and close their eyes.

- 3. Encourage them to sit tall by pulling up our imaginary puppet strings attached to our heads to sit tall, breathe deeply, and un-round and relax their shoulders. Inhale the shoulders up and exhale them back down.
- 4. Walk around the room and have children reach in to grab the first object they touch. Encourage the children to explore their object.
- 5. At first, I say words as they explore (I tied this into an earlier Attributes lesson) and ask them to concentrate on the word(s) that describe their object. I ask them to do this mindfully by focusing on feeling the object without speaking or peeking!!

Now you can be as creative as you like. I integrated learning about our 5 senses with Mindful Minutes by introducing calming music and different smells (peppermint, orange, etc.) but I'm sure that there are many other great ideas you have that will make this work in your classroom, too!

INJURY REPORTS & NEAR-MISSES!!

Greetings Teacher friends! We had our first TBCC (Teacher Board Consultation Committee) meeting of the year on October 29th. One of the main issues we have been strongly advocating for is ensuring the safety of all students and staff. I have heard from many teachers that safety, especially when dealing with students with moderate to severe behavioural issues, is a growing concern. We addressed this issue with the board, however, it seems that they are not receiving many reports from teachers and are unaware of many issues. After hearing from multiple teachers, this does not seem to align with what is truly happening in several classrooms. I cannot help but feel that many of these incidents are going unreported and so we have been strongly encouraged to report all incidents and near misses by completing a report. The form can be found on Staff Connect by searching the documents for the Occupational Incident/Injury Report.

Also, if it is a student who is injured or experiences a near miss please ensure to search for and fill out a **Student Incident/Injury Report**.

I recognize that filling in these forms may add to your workload, however, without these reports it is difficult to get you and your students the supports you need. Please, no matter how small the incident/near miss, take the time to complete these forms for every incident so that action can be taken to ensure we are all able to do the great work we do in the safest possible manner.

- Prepare for discussions with candidates and others by checking out <u>key talking points</u> regarding issues related to education.

- Donate to a political party of your choice.
- Get involved with the campaign of a candidate or party you wish to support.

TEACHERS' CONVENTION - HOW TO PRE-REGISTER FOR SESSIONS

The North Central Teachers' Convention Association has published the event schedule and, on December 3rd, they opened some sessions for pre-registration. Many of these sessions fill quickly and the ability to pre-register will end on January 25th at 12 pm. Tickets must be purchased (costs vary) online. The password for ticket purchases is "North".

ALTERNATE PD FOR CONVENTION

The 2019 North Central Teachers' Convention will be taking place on February 7th and 8th. If you plan to attend alternate professional development activities on those dates, you MUST submit an application for approval at least 20 days before the event (by January 17th at the latest).

Alternate PD will only be approved IF 1) it is relevant to professional practice and is NOT already included at convention, 2) it is an extraordinary opportunity that cannot be accessed at another time, and 3) it is an

organized pd event that exceeds ones provided at convention.

CLAUSE 9.5 FUNDING

Term 2 applications are now being accepted. Funding for term 2 applies to professional development activities which occur between February 1st, 2019, and August 31st, 2019. Currently, there are also still funds available for Term 1 opportunities (events which take place up to and including January 31st, 2019).
